The Market Report Professional Ponderings – August 2024

I think that many will agree that the past week or so of sun has been welcome and from driving around Buckinghamshire and Northamptonshire it appears that many people have made a start with combining and the Oilseed Rape appears to be complete, Barley is well under way and the Winter Wheat is ripening well with the extra sun. A lot of people will be questioning Oilseed Rape in their rotation this coming season and although it is a good break crop, the low yields and the high-risk establishment to avoid the flea beetle and pigeons, mean it is not a crop that you want to be worrying whether it will break even or not and relying on the one in approximately three-year bumper crop.

Livestock prices seem settled with fat lambs consistently around 300 pence per kilo assisting many farmers with their cash flow. However, it seems strange that the price of wheat is low with feed wheat at £175 per tonne considering the reduced area of wheat drilled with the expected lower yields following the poor growing conditions through winter and spring. Does this mean yields are better than expected?

My first month at Bletsoes has flown by and I have been busy undertaking a variety of work from tenancy matters to planning applications for agricultural buildings plus attending the two machinery auctions, both of which were a success with strong prices achieved. Since moving back south and living on the family farm near Silverstone, any free evenings and weekends have been busy as there is always

something to do, especially coming into harvest alongside some late summer haymaking.

Once again, the Rural Payments Agency (RPA) have changed their mind on the Sustainable Farming Incentive (SFI). The proposed option to upgrade and add options into an existing SFI agreement on the anniversary date has now been removed. This does not stop you adding to the area of rotational options within a current SFI agreement, but it is important to remember that you must plant at least 50% of the rotational area within the agreement, each year. If you were planning to add to your SFI agreement this is now only possible by creating a new agreement to run alongside any existing agreements. If possible, from a management point of view it would be easier to have the agreement commencing in the same month as before however, the start date is in the hands of the RPA, so there is no guarantee.

On a positive SFI note the RPA have released an expanded offer of 102 new options to add to the 2023 SFI options and Countryside Stewardship options under one umbrella and split into the following categories:

- actions for agroforestry
- actions for boundary features
- actions for buffer strips
- actions for farmland wildlife on arable and horticultural land
- actions for farmland wildlife and habitats on grassland
- actions for heritage
- actions for integrated pest management
- actions for moorland
- actions for nutrient management
- actions for organic farming
- actions for precision farming
- actions for species recovery and management
- actions for soil health
- actions for waterbodies

As I mentioned earlier many people will be questioning Oilseed Rape as a break crop, and now is a good time to look through the various SFI options and ponder what may fit into the rotation, while you are sat on the combine, before drilling or early cultivations commence. Combining will also remind you of all the awkward shaped fields and triangle corners, and these can also be entered into an SFI option such as CAHL3 Grassy field corners or blocks. The payment rate may not seem that high for the option, however, add in the time saved turning around and shunting into these areas and the inevitably lower yields and the SFI options are probably not so bad. If you do wish to investigate the SFI options and how they can fit into a rotation, a member of the Agricultural Team will be happy to help.

The Countryside Stewardship Capital Grants will continue as they were alongside the Farm Technology Fund but the advice is to make the most of these grants while they are still available, especially with the new Chancellor Rachel Reeves reportedly looking to plug the DEFRA £20 billion black hole.

In other news for the first time since March 2020 the Bank of England base rate has dropped albeit only one quarter of a percent to 5%, this will still make a difference to Base Rate loans and mortgages which will be welcomed by many and help with cash flow of many businesses. It will also make purchasing land subject to borrowing more appealing which is good news, as Bletsoes have just brought approximately 39.21 acres of arable and permanent pasture land to the market off Walgrave Road, Old. Another strong week this week with the SQQ at 297.05p/kg. Lighter lambs once again commanded the trade, a good showing of quality forward with numbers far higher than expected. Please book stock in before the sale day with Auctioneer Jake Wagstaff on 07487 526803. JM Ironmonger topped the day pence per kilo with a sterling show of Texel lambs selling to 324p/kg at 41kgs. W Betteridge topped the day overall at £165.55 for 55kgs Texels with 49kgs to 310p/kg and 43kgs to 320p/kg.

Highlights - Ellsbury House saw best end lighter weight Texels to 323p/kg for 37kgs with 38kgs to 318p/kg; P & M Careless topped with another strong run of Texel and Beltex crosses to 320p/kg for 39kgs; TR Tame & Son saw the trade of the day with a run of empty Suffolk Charollais forward at 38.5kgs selling to 315p/kg, 39kgs to 311p/kg and 37kgs to 310p/kg; JD Weaver saw a smart trade for quality with 47kg Texels to 293p/kg and 43kgs to 310p/kg.

Trade in both the stores and the ewe lambs were at never before seen levels with the alleys packed of new and old buyers.

Ewe Lambs - full confidence in breeding stock this year with many early breeding sales showing theaves at a high, farmers have looked to ewe lambs for replacements with a noticeable variation in buying accounts on the day. All in average saw £135.62. Lambs End topped the day with a strong showing of pure Texel ewe lambs selling to £170; GC Hodges & Son penned their usual consignment of Suffolk Mule ewe lambs being a credit to them this year looking well forward, topping to £162 for their first draw of big frames and best heads, followers were to £160 and £146 for three pens with runners to £135 twice and £132; JK Coldicott saw another fantastic draw of Suffolk Mules with a late born showing not holding them back topping to £152, £142 and £130, with runners to £125, £120 and £106; JD Weaver drew another quality run of Suffolk Mules with tuppers to £148 and runners at £142; AF & RF Slatter penned a smart pen of Suffolk Mules in the first row topping to £141; Kineton Lamb saw their Lleyn cross ewe lambs to £122 for two pens; W Bartlett & Son saw their Texel crosses to £115.

Store Lambs - never before seen levels with mid to long term lambs finding by far the most demand and trade to match. All in average £102.94. F Johnson-Gibbs topped the day with best bred Texels to £152 with Charollais crosses to £130; WV Harris & Son penned well uniformed run of best bred Beltex cross Continentals seeing a high of £132 for the best shape and £128 for their following pen with the biggest frame lambs also selling to £128; Walters Farm Partnership penned a strong run of good framed Charollais crosses seeing the best to £120, with followers at £115 twice, £112, twice, £110, £108.50, £102 only to be outperformed by their Jacob cross Charollais selling to £95.50. The vast majority sold in excess of £100. The best sold look the longest term lambs looking to be around £35 dearer on the year.

NFU SURVEY

NFU are currently conducting a **<u>survey about tail docking and castration in</u> <u>lambs</u> to help inform discussions with the government on potential new restrictions.**

We kindly ask that you complete the survey, and share the survey with your customers, to gather vital information on the impact of any proposed restrictions to the current practises of tail docking and castration within both farming businesses and the lamb market.

Please see full details and the survey link below.

Tail docking and castration in lambs is considered necessary to manage negative health and welfare impacts caused by fly-strike, or to avoid unwanted pregnancies and complications during post-slaughter processing.

Both procedures are permitted in the UK and governed by legislation however, the Farm Animal Welfare Council's report released in December 2022 discussed the implications of castration and tail docking (which are in the legal terms described as mutilation procedures) on the welfare of lambs and makes several recommendations related to these routine management procedures.

As a result of this report and due to growing pressure on the veterinary profession and resource, there is potential for regulatory changes to be taken forward by the new government.

The NFU is therefore seeking sheep producers' participation in a short survey on the lamb production and husbandry and management methods. (Open to both members and non-members)

This will provide us with a comprehensive understanding of practices within the sector and the necessary information and data to highlight the detrimental impact of introducing restrictions on these routine management procedures.

Produce - More choice than Tesco's and a lot more fun than pushing the trolley round the isles. Preventing Water Pollution & Avoiding Cattle Watering Breaches

The Environment Agency have highlighted a number of breaches where farmers have not taken reasonable precautions to prevent agricultural diffuse pollution occurring in relation to cattle watering.

Livestock access to watercourse can cause various issues, including:

- Banks to collapse which increases flood risk
- Build-up of sediment causing pollution and damaging habitats
- Siltation and affecting how channels work
- Animal wastes in water posing a risk to human and animal health

Measures can be taken to prevent these issues:

- Fence off surface water to prevent livestock damaging the banks and fouling in the water. This will also allow natural habitats to develop which will provide protection from soil erosion
- Previously managed or constructed drinking points in watercourse are no longer recommended as they can cause poaching in one area. Alternative watering facilities should be installed.
- Position livestock feeders and drinkers away from water courses and move at frequent intervals to avoid poaching.
- Plant hedges alongside watercourse to prevent access and enhance biodiversity.

Funding through Countryside Stewardship Capital Grants is available for capital items such as fencing. Please contact a member of the Agricultural Team for further information.
